- cyberbullying
- online predators
- privacy breaches



WHAT?

To keep them safe online, we are:

- researching risks for children online
- giving young people skills to make change
- supporting youth campaigners to help peers stay safe online

Bridging the digital divide in Vietnam

WHO?

Ethnic minority children in Vietnam are struggling to learn. All children deserve:

- access to learning technology
- educational continuity
- support from teachers and family



WHAT?

To help them learn, we are:

- developing an interactive children's reading app
- training teachers to help students learn on apps
- helping families support children's reading

[49% GIRLS, 51% BOYS]



630 adults
[50% WOMEN, 50% MEN]

Upping immunisation in the Philippines

WHO?

Filipino children are missing out on lifesaving vaccinations because of:

- low awareness and vaccine hesitancy
- inefficient healthcare systems
- vaccine supply issues



WHAT?

To increase immunisation rates, we are:

- encouraging mothers to get children immunised
- building a national immunisation register and training health workers to use it
- advocating for improved access to vaccines

Reducing male violence in Cambodia

WHO?

Male violence against Cambodian women and children is unacceptably high. This is fuelled by:

- harmful social norms
- limited resources to implement government policy
- impacts of the pandemic



WHAT?

To help protect women and children, we are:

- helping caregivers parent positively
- encouraging male engagement in child rearing and the household
- conducting research to advocate for strengthened government policy

2,100 adults
[41% WOMEN, 59% MEN]



223 people with disabilities
[47% CHILDREN, 53% ADULTS]
